




Online Survey

Open from Mid-April to Early June 2023 **67** complete responses

Nearly 80% of respondents go to the Downtown Waterfront **specifically for events**

37% of respondents **drive and park** to access the Downtown Waterfront

Almost 50% of respondents are unsure where to park in the Downtown Waterfront

Over 30% of respondents feel that street crossings are unsafe and that there is not enough signage, and signage is confusing

Respondents would like more options for dining and drinking and passive recreation

There are **many mobility challenges for bike/ped** in the Downtown Waterfront area

Respondents want **better sidewalks and bicycle amenities with clear signage**

Equity

Accessible, affordable, and inclusive for all regardless of race, income, physical ability, age, culture, etc.





Experience Places and spaces that evoke feelings of comfort, a sense of belonging, and safety are memorable, fun, and sustainable





Identity Legible, easily navigable, coherent places and spaces that create a sense of place, and are welcoming and memorable to residents and visitors





1. Equal Waterfront Access for All Neighborhoods



- » Some neighborhoods have higher racial and ethnic diversity such as the Lower West Side, Ellicott, and the Old First Ward.
- Physical improvements so all neighborhoods have equal access to waterfront

3. Access for all Mobility Abilities



- » Physical design should accommodate all ages from toddlers to seniors
- Physical design should practice universal accessibility to accommodate all ability types: blind, deaf, reduced mobility, wheelchairs, and others

2. Cultural Inclusiveness in all Public Spaces



- Physical spaces should be flexible enough to allow for changing programming and uses (e.g., playing cricket, football, or soccer) as neighborhood demographics evolve over time
- Provide representation of all culture in public spaces throughout the waterfront where it is currently missing (e.g., colors, murals, signage, etc.)

4. Enabling Economic Opportunity



- » Encourage incubator spaces to provide training, skill building, and others for new businesses
- » Identify spaces for new business to allow for entrepreneurs to test new businesses

Equity Analysis and Assessment

#1 Strengthening connections to neighborhoods and Downtown

Improved multimodal connections along existing streets under/over I-190, as well as creating new pedestrian and bicycle corridors from Porter Avenue to Chicago Street, will create convenient connections to the waterfront for new and current visitors and residents.




